

Getting Ready for the Five Starts Regional Exhibit



Members are invited to submit your artwork into our first regional art exhibit. The deadline for entries is March 11, 2019. Entries (photo of your artwork plus entry form) are submitted online.

Dedham Art Association is collaborating with four other art associations for this unique exhibit and hence the title of "Five Stars." The goal is to provide a juried and judged exhibit opportunity for artist members that will be open and accessible to the public. Exhibitors are juried (selected) based on their entries by an independent judge and cash prizes totaling \$1000 will be awarded by the same judge.

A free workshop was held on January 26 to learn how to submit photos (.jpg) of artwork online and how to submit an entry online for this exhibit. If you missed it and would like the handouts, email: DedhamArtAssociation@gmail.com or call Naomi at 781-449-4528.

Each Member Artists is invited to submit an original artwork in the following mediums: painting, drawing or printmaking. The artwork should have been created in the last five years and not previously displayed at the Mosesian Center for the Arts. Art work must be the artist's original design in concept and execution (e.g., from life or from the artists own idea or reference photo; completely executed by the artist's own hand.) No size limitation.

The exhibition will take place in the Mosesian gallery spaces which are handicap-accessible from April 4 – May 10, 2019. The Opening Reception is on April 12th at the Mosesian Center for the Arts. See the website for details: https://mca-fivestarsregionalexhibition.artcall.org/

Miller, and watercolor from Nancy Howell and Joan Percy. I attended the DAA workshops in various mediums.

I served as Treasurer for two years and President for six. I started the first annual "art show and sale" of members' work in June 2008. It was a fun way to show our work to each other and to invited friends, family and the community to see our artwork. In 2011, along with Peggy Desmond, I set up the Endicott branch of "open Studios." It was such as success that it was repeated in 2012.

"Let's Do Our Own Critique" by Nan Daly, Member Columnist

Do you have an unfinished painting that just isn't working? (Take heart. We all do. Probably many more than one.) Before you give up, here are a few ideas that may help.



- 1. Place a mat around it. Abstracts must be separated from their surroundings in order to be seen clearly, but all paintings benefit by being isolated from your work table or the brown masking tape you used or the paint splatters all over your easel.
- 2. Place the painting on a chair and walk acoss the room. Can you still "see" the shapes in your painting from that distance? If not, try increasing the contrast between light and dark areas.
- **3.** Is the composition bothering you? Turn the painting upside down or look at the painting in a mirror. Reversing your normal view can make awkward spots apparent.
- **4. Place your painting somewhere in your home** where you will come upon it unexpectedly. Try to look with fresh eyes, as if the painting were done by someone else. What would you tell that artist if they asked?
- **5. Muddy areas?** Lift them out and paint again with fresh color, or add a layer of opaque paint to cover them. There are also many products available that will cover an area with a new "paintable" surface. Check out those made specifically for watercolor, pastel, acrylics, heavy textures, etc.
- **6.** Is the painting still driving you crazy? Tuck it away or throw it away, but don't let it drain away the enthusiasm and joy that made you want to paint it in the first place. Pick up a brush and start something new.
